The King Maker of New Zealand Politics

» Wednesday 25th August 2004

When we hear the name Winston Peters, we usually think 'controversial and colourful'. The one word that certainly does not describe him is 'boring'. Born in Whangarei, he studied Politics, History and Law at the University of Auckland and worked as a teacher and a lawyer. He entered parliament in 1978, lost his seat in 1981, and re-entered in 1984 as the National Party's spokesperson on Maori Affairs, Consumer Affairs, and Transport. In 1987 he continued as a spokesperson for Maori Affairs, picking up Employment and Race Relations also. In 1990 he became the Minister of Maori Affairs, and since then his political career has been in constant flux, with Peters falling in and out of favour with parties, leaders and the public. In recent times, he has campaigned on three main issues: reducing immigration, increasing punishment for crime, and settling issues around the Treaty of Waitangi.
